Summary of landscape character

This is a gently sloping, pastoral landscape to the west of Braunton, bounded to the south by the B3231 Saunton to Braunton road. Settlement is restricted to small farmsteads surrounded by medium to small scale irregular fields including some pony paddocks. Long views to the south and south-west stretch as far as Braunton Burrows and Saunton Bay; Hartland Point is visible on distant horizons. There is a strong visual and physical relationship with the adjacent downland slopes above (LDU 526) to the north and west. The masts on Long Lane (within LDU 403) are a feature of skylines to the north.
