Summary of landscape character

This LDU comprises the western edges of Westward Ho!, extending into the AONB along the base of a prominent coastal headland. The landscape is dominated by development, mainly hotels, holiday parks, a leisure centre and brightly coloured beach huts with expansive views across Northam Country Park (its wide beach and sand dunes) and the distant coastline beyond the Taw & Torridge Estuary. Eastward views from within the LDU are dominated by the built form of Westward Ho! which has spread along a prominent ridgeline, along with views of the settlement of Appledore in the distance. Although the elevated cliff-side location of the LDU affords long views northwards across the scenic coastline of the AONB, the overriding perceptions are of a developed landscape strongly associated with leisure and tourism.

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Flat cliff 'ledge' backed by the steeply sloping ridgeline of Cornborough Cliff and Kipling Tors. The LDU is fronted by Westward Ho! KEY FACTORS INFLUENCING LANDSCAPE CONDITION

Perceptual qualities Views	The wildness of the adjacent cliffs, along with long views along the AONB coastline, contrast greatly with the developed nature of the LDU – which forms a perceived hard edge to the protected landscape. Views to sprawling settlement to the east also reduce the landscape's sense of tranquillity. As above. The development within this landscape is also visually prominent in views from other landscapes, particularly sections of undeveloped AONB coastline.
Land use	Areas of undeveloped land are few and farbetween in this LDU.

Trees and woodland	Secondary woodland and scrub softens the southern fringes of the LDU, forming a transition to the steep slope behind.
Semi-natural habitats	Semi-natural habitat is restricted to the scrub / woodland on the southern slopes backing the LDU. It is important to retain this both as a buffer to development, and as an ecological link to the wider County Wildlife Site of Cornborough Cliff, managed by the National Trust.
Settlement and development	The settlement of Westward Ho! has extended westwards from its historic core to cover much of this LDU in the form of holiday-related development.
Local vernacular	Modern hotels and other buildings consistently use white and cream/peach coloured render and tiled roofs, mimicking some of the architectural details from the Victorian period. However, many of the buildings are large and out of scale in their highly visible landscape setting.
